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The IB Learner Profile

The International Baccalaureate® (IB) learner profile describes a broad range of human capacities and responsibilities that go beyond academic success.

The IB learner profile represents a broad range of characteristics and responsibilities that encompass academic, personal, social and emotional growth. The ability to develop and demonstrate the attributes within the Learner Profile provides the foundation for developing “international mindedness” and teaches students the attributes needed for making positive changes. The IB describes the Learner Profile as the “heart of the program” with the focus on putting the student at the center of learning.



“The learner profile is the IB mission statement translated into a set of learning outcomes for the 21st century. The ten aspirational qualities of the learner profile inspire and motivate the work of teachers, students, and schools, providing a statement of the aims and values of the IB and a definition of what we mean by “international-mindedness”. The ten attributes aligned by the IB make for a well-rounded individual who is responsible for their own needs and learning and empathetic to the needs of others.

Principled learners act with integrity and honesty, with a strong sense of fairness, justice, and respect for the dignity of the individual, groups, and communities. They take responsibility for their own actions and the consequences that accompany them.

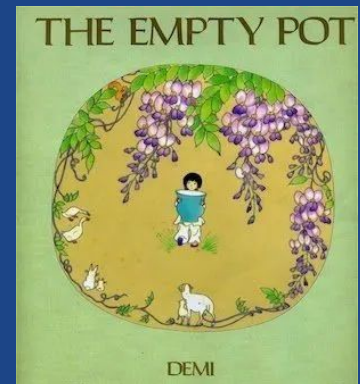
