ABOUT CPICS

& Our Historic Town Hall Meeting



Public education options for students and families expanded dramatically as states began to pass charter school legislation in the 1990s. The success of early charter schools led to a push from the U.S. Department of Education and others for charter school expansion and replication which, in turn, gave birth to charter networks, led by both for-profit and nonprofit management organizations. The charter management organizations (CMO's) attracted, and continue to attract a great degree of institutional and investor capital which have accelerated its growth. Currently there is rough parity in the number of schools operated by management organizations and those that are independently managed but network schools far outpace independent schools in funding and political influence. This has had a pronounced effect on the concept of "chartering" and how charter schools are perceived by the public.

On October 12–13 of 2017, the NYC based advocacy group, The Coalition of Community Charter Schools, held a national Symposium bringing together leaders of independent charter schools from 26 states,

education advocates and social justice activists. The purpose of the Symposium was to celebrate 30 years since the concept of "chartered schools" was first discussed in a public forum at the "Itasca Seminar" and to have deep and candid conversations about pedagogy, race and the bruising political and social battles that have unfortunately arisen between advocates and foes of the movement for charter schools. The highlights of the Symposium can be found here.

On October 13, 2017, the group unanimously ratified a Statement of Principles and passed the following resolution.

"Students, families, educators (and indeed the entire country) need a national, independent, democratically organized group to advocate for independently managed, financially transparent, community oriented public charter schools as articulated in our Statement of Principles."

CPICS was born on that day.



Our Focus Our focus is on independent, self-managed charter schools that exemplify the original intent of the charter school movement. CPICS schools provide options in public education, explore new leadership structures and innovate and collaborate in the public interest. We aspire to be the democratic voice of our schools and to promote public school autonomy, transparency and accountability.

Strengthening our independent charter sector is a powerful way to increase excellent public schools and expand educational opportunities for all students. We do this by employing three main strategies:

Shaping Practices We provide charter school leaders with resources and services they need to make the best decisions for their students, families, staff and stakeholders.

Informing Policy We work with policy makers at the state and federal levels to advocate for policies that support independent charter schools and work to the benefit of all public education.

Increasing Collaboration We aim to increase collaborations between schools and school leaders nationwide. This exchange of ideas not only increases best practices but also creates more efficiency in the charter community.

Our Vision All children will have access to public schools that provide innovative and high quality student learning experiences

Our Mission Empowering and advocating for public independent charter schools

Our Beliefs We aspire to be great community schools of choice for the families we serve.

We are united behind the original ideals of the charter school contract. We embrace our diverse communities, which include immigrants, people of color, children with disabilities, the homeless, English language learners, people of all faiths, and the LGBTQ community. We believe in the power of schools to transform the lives of young people AND in the responsibility of government to ensure that all children have adequate nutrition, shelter, health care, and educational opportunity. And we subscribe to these fundamental principles.

RICARDO MIRELES

Academia Avance I Los Angeles, California

BOARD CHAIR

Ricardo Mireles is the Executive Director and Founder of Academia Avance, the independent college preparatory charter public school in the Northeast Los Angeles neighborhood of Highland Park serving over 400 students in grades 6-12. The Avance college attainment outcomes for its graduates top 80% enrolling in college, the majority at four year institutions, with a 70% persistence rate. A key component of this success is the Avance Life Prep program which includes extensive workplace education experience in a professional setting internship aligned to each student's career goals. Also, almost half of the students participate in at least one of the five interscholastic athletic teams, which have netted over a dozen league titles in the last three years.

Ricardo is a graduate of Columbia College, studied at the MIT Department of Urban Studies and Planning, and taught at the UCLA School of Public Policy and Social Research and at the Don Bosco Technical Institute.



IRIS MARIA CHÁVEZ

Equity Action Partners | Portland, Oregon

Iris Maria Chávez is an education advocate and public affairs consultant, currently working with national and Oregon-focused organizations to advance equity by supporting the creation of sound, just policies that better communities in Oregon and across the nation. Iris Maria came to the Pacific Northwest from Washington, D.C., where she worked for over a decade in education policy and advocacy for civil rights and advocacy organizations such as the Education Trust and the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC). Iris Maria's volunteer work also focuses on community engagement and equity, she currently serves on the Partnership for Safety & Justice Board of Directors and the City Club of Portland Board of Governors.



DIANNE JACOBSON

Skyview School, Inc. | Prescott, Arizona

Dianne has been the Operations Manager at Skyview School in Prescott, Arizona since 2006. Previously she has served on charter governing boards and worked hundreds of hours supporting charter education as a parent and volunteer. Although she always understood the academic and social benefits charters provided children, at Skyview she became aware of a deeper truth—charter schools have the ability to nurture and even heal a child's desire to learn. This "whole child" approach to education can be explored within the autonomy of charter school design, most effectively when curricula and methods are developed by educators and parents, and not politicians and legislators.

Academy of the City Charter School I Woodside, New York

Richard Lee is the Founding Principal of Academy of the City Charter School in Woodside, NY, a school that is as diverse as the Borough of Queens. Previously, Richard was the Division Coordinator for seven years for grades 1–4 at The Bank Street School for Children. Richard has organized, led and presented in various workshop including NYSAIS, DOE and NAIS. Most of these have been about Children of Color affinity groups and Social Studies curriculum. Richard is Asian-American and feels strongly about the presence of administrators who reflect the community that they

David Lockett is a STEM teacher at Bok Academy in Lake Wales, FL as well as an NSTA Aerospace Advisory Board Member. At Bok Academy, he is responsible for implementing a project-based curriculum for all students as they rotate through the STEM Lab. David has a distinguished and diverse background in the fields of Astronomy, Biotechnology, and Engineering, and is an advocate and practitioner of S.T.E.M. accessibility for all students. David has participated in a variety of NSF projects throughout North and South America, including the Astronomy in Chile's Ambassadors Educator Program and Innovators Developing Accessible Tools for Astronomy.



CHRIS NORWOOD

Florida Association of Independent Public Schools I Miami, Florida

Christopher Norwood is the Founder of the Florida Association of Independent Public Schools and the Governance Institute for School Accountability (GISA). Christopher is the former Executive Director of Lawyers for Children (Florida), and is certified by the Florida Commissioner for Education to provide Governance Training to Charter Schools. He is sought out by many to represent charter schools with application appeals, terminations and non-renewals before Florida's Administrative Law Judges and School Board Administrative Hearings. Christopher chairs the City of Miami Education Advisory Board and serves on the Audit and Budget Committee of Miami-Dade Public Schools.



HEATHER VUNCANNON Uwharrie Charter Academy | Asheboro, North Carolina

Heather Vuncannon is the founder of Uwharrie Charter Academy located in rural Asheboro, North Carolina. With STE3AM (Entrepreneurship, Environment, and Engineering) and Project-based learning at its core, the school continues to drive innovation in the region by disrupting the current rhetoric in traditional education with its "out-of-the-box" teaching and learning strategies. Heather earned her master's in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and later her school administration degree from High Point University. She has lead Uwharrie Charter from the first day it opened in 2013.

JOHN MERROW

John Merrow began his career as an education reporter with NPR over 40 years ago and in 2012 became the first journalist to receive the prestigious McGraw Prize in Education. John's work has taken him from community colleges to kindergarten classrooms, from the front lines of teacher protests to policy debates on Capitol Hill. John is a contributor to USA Today, the NY Times, the Washington Post, the LA Times and Education Week. John publishes the educational blog, "The Merrow Report" and his latest book is Addicted to Reform: A 12-Step Program to Rescue Public Education.

Q&A WITH JOHN MERROW

Q&A with John Merrow

SZ: What do you see as the charter school movement's greatest success?

JM: Charter schools have challenged traditional public schools to be better and many districts have responded positively by upping their game. The movement in general has unleashed many talented educators who have been able to implement innovative programs.

SZ: What do you see as the charter school movement's greatest failing?

JM: The greatest failure of charter schools is an unwillingness, on the part of their advocacy organizations to ride herd on profiteers who have found loopholes in regulations and have taken advantage of it. That's why it's so important that the movement has an organization like the one you are starting.

SZ: What do you see in the charter movement that the implacable charter detractors do not?

JM: It's a difference in how we see that half filled/half empty glass. The strident critics see the negatives and the failure of the political system to rein in profiteers and hold people accountable. They are also reacting to the harsh discipline and overemphasis on testing that seems to be the norm in many large charter networks. I see your organization as having a chance to set high standards and share good news. Let's not curse the darkness without first lighting a bunch of candles.



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
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STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES

We are united behind the original ideals of the charter school contract.

We embrace our diverse communities, which include immigrants, people of color, children with disabilities, the homeless, English language learners, people of all faiths, and the LGBTO community. We aspire to be great community schools of choice for the families we serve.

Equity

- We reaffirm that charter schools are public schools.
 All public schools should receive equitable funding.
- We are committed to transparency in our practices and accountability to our students, parents, government authorizers, and the public at-large.
- As public institutions, our charter schools are open, welcoming, and responsive to our many stakeholders.

Autonomy & Accountability

- Autonomy in exchange for accountability is the bedrock principle of charter schools.
- Real accountability must be rooted in the development of the whole child and the needs of society to improve our democracy and cultivate citizens who can solve the intractable problems of our time.
- The work we do at our schools is for the greater good. We guard against any practice that subordinates the work we do to personal or corporate profit.

Collaboration

- Because charter schools were created as laboratories of innovation, we seek out opportunities for collaboration among district, charter, and independent schools.
- We seek out opportunities to learn from and exchange ideas with our colleagues.
- Our workplaces are collaborative, not adversarial.
 We invest in our teachers so that they can invest in us.

Diversity

- We commit to serving students who reflect our communities and neighborhoods, particularly students with the greatest educational needs.
- We actively recruit, retain and serve the highestneed students, such as students with disabilities, English language learners, and students with challenging life circumstances.
- We are determined to educate all of our students to the best of our ability, every day.

Innovation

- Our independence is a public trust. Autonomy provides the freedom to innovate and differentiate.
- We have an obligation to research, develop and implement new ideas, practices and strategies.
- School innovation is reinforced by use of multiple measures for evaluation. We must learn how to measure what is truly important and germane to the mission of our schools.
- We share these practices, serving as a laboratory for all other public schools.

Respect for Teachers

- We rely on a professional and compassionate teaching staff to model the attitudes we expect in our students. Our schools provide innovative opportunities that encourage young teachers to excel at their craft and become great educators.
- Personnel evaluations and all our employment practices are fair and transparent.

Governance & Community

- Strong independent boards and an engaged community are essential to school governance and student success.
- Boards must be fully and demonstrably independent from service providers and must have robust process for community input.
- Decision-making involves feedback from our students, families and the community at large.
