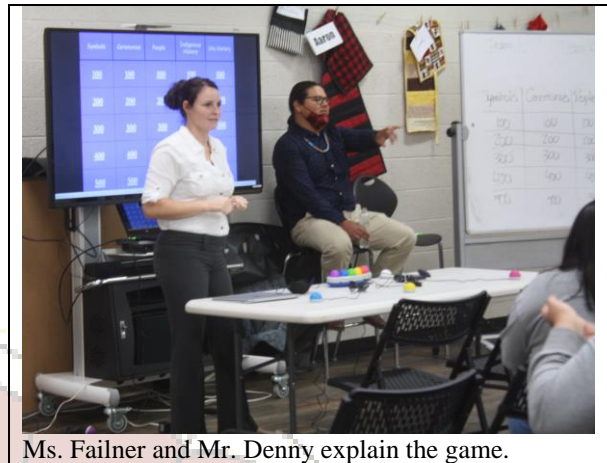

She divided students into three teams, and asked questions of varying difficulty levels about Ute History and Native History. Some examples of the questions were: "What beaded design identifies us as Ute People?" (Rose) "What symbol is on the seal of the Northern Ute Tribe?" (Golden Eagle, Feather, Sun, 3 Figures, Peace Pipe, Mountain Peaks) "What shape is considered a sacred shape and is used for ceremonies?" (Circle)

The game was super fun to watch, and a great learning experience about Ute History as well as a great reminder for the students who have been learning these important historical facts!

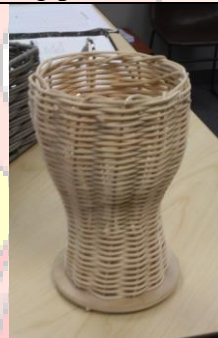

He told a story from Native Mythology of a boy who was in the tall grass near his village when cavalry came through and killed most of the people. The creator gave the boy hoops and told him how to dance. As the boy danced, the cavalry, even though they were looking for other people to kill, were not able to find him.

Charles talked about how when he was little, he saw other men hoop dancing, and wanted to try it. When his grandfather discovered Charles' interest in becoming a hoop dancer, his grandfather coached him. He worked hard, and eventually became very good at it, winning all sorts of awards for his dancing.

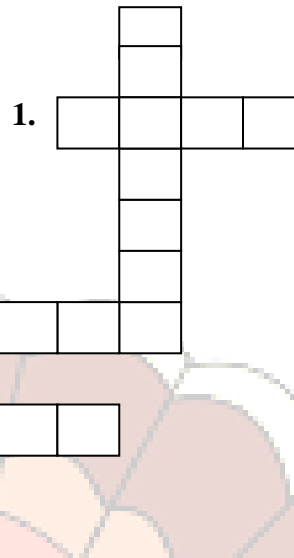
